Note for teachers: The following is based on a true story about a Tawny Owl who was found by a concerned member of the public and brought to Suffolk Owl Sanctuary to be rehabilitated. It includes some useful owl facts and has been designed to help children to learn about owls.

Once upon a time there was a small cottage on the edge of the woods. In the woods lived a family of Tawny Owls. When the chicks were a few months old, they started hunting in the woods by themselves, catching all sorts of prey such as mice, voles and shrews with their sharp talons. Their parents didn't want them in their nesting tree anymore, so the chicks had to find a new place to sleep during the day.

- 5) What does Sooty use to catch his prey?
- 6) Where does Sooty decide would make a perfect place to rest?
- 7) What colour are Sooty's eyes?
- 8) What colour are Sooty's feathers?
- 9) What shape is Sooty's face?
- 10) Name one of the things the family did to keep Sooty safe.

Extension questions:

- A) What kind of place could you take an injured owl to?
- B) What noise do Tawny owls make?
