Vulture Culture

Range

Found across the Americas, from southern Canada in the north to the southern tip of Argentina in the

south.

Habitat

Mostly associated with open habitats such as grassland, prairies and pastures, but also found in desert, wetland and subtropical forests across their range. Often seen over urban areas.

Diet

Primarily carrion, preferring freshly dead animals. Has been reported eating insects and small reptiles, and some plant matter (shoreline vegetation, coconuts and pumpkins)

Breeding

Female lays 1-3 eggs on a bare surface, usually on a cliff, crevice or rocky outcrop.

Breeding season varies throughout the range but generally March to

Eggs are incubated by both parents and hatch between 30-40 days. Care is provided for about 10-12 weeks, by which point the chicks have fledged. Families stay together until the autumn,

Did you know?

Turkey Vultures have an amazing sense of smell. This allows them to find carcasses in wooded areas before other scavengers.
